Context:

- Legacy: Settler colonialism & migrant labour
- Industrialisation & proletarianisation
- Dichotomous agrarian landscape
- Rural poverty, esp. former homelands
- Longstanding deagrarianisation



... & more recent developments



How do:

...'fragmented classes of labour' reproduce themselves?

...process articulate with social differentiation & accumulation?

...these relate to changes across global South?



'Communal area' households sustained by:

- 1. Links to formal & urban labour markets
- 2. Agrarian activities & endowments
- 3. Informal sector activities
- 4. State welfare payments

 Repertoires of activities & migration practices (In realm of production & circulation)

1. Labour markets

(Formal labour market earnings)

- SA = high wage dependency
- Major determinant of pov. & class position
- Also mediate agri. production (& social differen.)
- But waning: capital intensive, labour 'un-intensive' growth path
- And deindustrialisation

2. Agriculture



- Agriculture (& land based activities)
- Variable, contingent, frequently small
- 'Deagrarianisation' led by racial land dispossession
- Largely unchanged since 1994


3. Informal sector employment

- SA paradox: small, beleaguered sector
- Why? Historically proscribed & credit, skill, infrastuct. constraints
- Also crowed out by powerful, core economy
- MEC (Minerals Energy Complex) concentration


4. State welfare grants

- Unconditional cash transfers
- + 30% of pop
- Categories: elderly, disabled, children
 ZAR 1500 (€95),
 (child) ZAR 350 (€22)
- Embedded in larger 'distributional regime'
- Inequality reducing

'post-agrarian' countryside

- Constrained opportunities
- Limited place of land based activities & endowments
- But crucial locale for social reproduction (recuperation, retirement etc.)
- Deagrarianisation / post-productivism
